

Happy New Year!

The start of a New Year always means some new hustle and bustle in Pierre – The 2023
Legislative Session kicked off this week on Tuesday with the State of the State address following a weekend of Inaugural celebrations for Gov. Kristi Noem and her second term in office.
We have a huge freshman class of legislators this year – 30 in the

House (two have previously served in the Legislature), and five in the Senate. That means we have a lot of new faces to meet, and a lot of education to do.

We kicked off that process in December when legislators were here for the Budget Address and orientation. We work with the other Associations in our office building to host a meet-and-greet reception during that time. It's a great opportunity to put faces with names, and get to know people on a bit of a personal level before the real work begins. Thanks to SDPhA Past President Kristen Carter for joining me as we made some new connections.

If you've hung around here very long, you know SDPhA began work on Pharmacy Benefit Manager (PBM) initiatives for 2023 even before the gavel fell on the 2022 Legislative Session. For a bit of background, SB 163, our 2022 PBM bill, cleared the Senate Health Committee during the 97th Session on a 5-2 vote. Ultimately, however, it failed on a 17-17 vote on the Senate Floor. Our sponsor gave intent to reconsider, but that reconsideration failed.

As of the minute that I write this article, we continue to work with a variety of stakeholders toward an agreement on language for this session. We'll have more news to share when the time is right (AKA: SOON) on some of the particulars, but here's what you need to know, and can do right now.

Talk to your legislators

Your story matters. They need to hear from you – early, and often. You don't need talking points from me to tell your story. You live the reality of what PBMS cost you and your patients each and every day. "Official" talking points from me regarding specific legislation will be forthcoming, but what you need to share most, is the honest truth of your reality.

So how do you do that? We encourage you to invite your local lawmakers into your pharmacy. Show them the issues you face on the daily because of PBMs, and educate them about the fees they impose. It's important for them to know that these fees are unpredictable, and come months after the fact. It's also essential to point out that you don't get to choose - these are take it or leave it contracts, and if you are going to serve your patients, you have to sign the dotted line. What's more -- while the rest of the world can raise prices to deal with inflation – you certainly can't do that with prescriptions medications. They need to hear all of those realities from YOU. They also need to understand exactly what happens to your patients, and your communities if you cannot continue keep the doors open. I cannot stress enough now much weight YOUR STORY carries in the chambers.



If you need a little help explaining what is PBM is, does, or how we got to this point with them in the first place:

- PBMs were originally created in the 1960s to help insurers contain drug spending. They negotiate agreements with the drug manufacturers on behalf of insurers, and get paid rebates by the manufacturers. Their buying power was intended to reduce healthcare costs and pass savings to patients. But little oversight has led to this:
- The Top 3 PBMs (CVS Caremark, Express Scripts and Optum Rx) control nearly 80% of the market.
- PBMs determine which medications will be covered by the plan or plan formulary
- PBMs determine which pharmacies will be included in a prescription drug plan's network
- PBMs determine how much those pharmacies will be paid for their services

This is all a huge factor is why the pharmacy deserts in South Dakota continue to grow.

- 13 SD counties have NO pharmacy; 25 SD counties have only ONE pharmacy
- In many cases those pharmacies are THE only access to the healthcare system in their communities.

You are, in so many cases across our rural state, the only member of the healthcare team in many communities. You are the entry point into system for so many who would be statistics without you. No delivery driver can council a patient on drug interactions, take a blood pressure reading, or help someone determine a proper OTC product for any number of conditions. YOU are the medication experts, and you ARE the trusted source and lifeline for so many in our rural areas. We're counting on you to paint the picture of exactly that.

Legislative Days | Feb. 7-8, 2023

Legislative Days is also the perfect opportunity to share with your legislators – or maybe meet them for the first time! There's nothing like experiencing the legislative process first-hand. We always have a great group of students at Legislative days, but we'd sure love to see more practicing pharmacists, too!

Here's the Plan:

- Tuesday evening join us for a meal at Red Rossa and a townhall style opportunity for pharmacists, pharmacy technicians and pharmacy students to learn about our work thus far in the legislative session. You'll hear updates from lobbying team and others.
- Wednesday morning, join us bright and early (in the interest of full disclosure, it's usually more early than bright that time of year) as we provide wellness screenings at the Capitol, courtesy of the SDSU student pharmacists who attended.
- This is a fantastic opportunity for students to hone their skills by providing the screenings, and showcase the broader range of the great work you all do each day. It's also a unique chance for you to meet your lawmakers and help them learn more about the issues impacting the profession.

While lobbying is a necessary part of politics, so are your grassroots efforts. Please continue to talk with your local legislators and educate them on the unfair practices that PBMs use. The list is long, and the result has forced pharmacy closures. That means patients sometimes lose access to much needed medications and sometimes the only medical professional in their community. Your words and stories are more valuable than you can imagine. Invite them into your pharmacy to see it all first hand.

We also invite all of you to join us at Legislative Days again this year. This year it will be held February 7th and 8th. Tuesday night will begin with a dinner and Legislative Update at 6pm at Red Rossa. We will again be joined by many SDSU Pharmacy Students Wednesday morning for Health Screenings at the Capital starting at 8am. This is a great time to learn and understand the legislative process and meet some of your local lawmakers. There were three new SD full-time pharmacy licenses issued: Lewis Family Drug, LLC dba Lewis Family Drug #48, Watertown, License # 100-2083; Hy-Vee, Inc. dba Hy-Vee Pharmacy Fulfillment Center (4069), Sioux Falls, License # 100-2084; and Lewis Family Drug, LLC dba Lewis Family Drug #49, Plankinton (telepharmacy), License # 100-2085. There was one new part-time SD pharmacy license issued: Avera McKennan dba AMG Family Health Center – Dawley Farm Emergency Department, Sioux Falls, License # 200-1759.

Donated Drug Redispensing Rules Effective November 27, 2022

The Interim Rules Review Committee met on November 1, 2022 and after Board testimony and legislator questions, certified that ARSD 20:51:35 could move forward to final form. The rules became effective on November 27, 2022 and can be found on the LRC website here: ARSD 20:51:35. The programmatic forms, database, and details are being finalized. Keep an eye out for these if you are interested in participating.

PDMP at Risk of Losing Federal Funding for Statewide Gateway

In 2019, the SD Board of Pharmacy secured a federal grant to fund the integration of the SD Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (SD PDMP) into your entity's electronic health record (EHR) platform or pharmacy management system (PMS) and for the enhanced NarxCare PDMP report. As you are aware, this funding stream was not a guarantee for more than 2 years. We were able to provide it for 3

years, but the time has come when the Board is no longer able to support the costs of these licensing agreements with the vendor. Unfortunately, due to a recent denial of federal grant funding, we will be unable to continue support of these PDMP services starting on February 1, 2023. To be clear, the funding support will only affect the way you access the PDMP and the availability of the enhanced NarxCare report, not the PDMP itself. Bamboo Health will be reaching out to all existing users in the next month to discuss payment options if your entity chooses to continue these services. You can also contact Bamboo Health directly at customers@bamboohealth.com to speak with a representative about service continuation. As a reminder, access to the SD PDMP remains available via the PMP AWARxE web portal to prescribers, pharmacists, and prescriber delegates. We appreciate your partnership in these valuable life-saving projects, and we are committed to continue to find ways to make the PDMP integration and NarxCare more accessible and affordable. Board FAQ for Pharmacists, Technicians, and Interns by Hannah Juracek SDSU P4 Regulatory Rotation Student

The Mission of the South Dakota Board of Pharmacy is to protect and promote the health and safety of the public by supporting pharmacists and pursuing the highest quality pharmaceutical care through education, communication, licensing, legislation, regulation, and enforcement. Here are some frequently asked questions and their corresponding answers to help navigate the Board's requirements and Website:

When is it necessary to notify the board of personal information changes?

- 1. Pharmacists, technicians, and interns must notify the Board within 10 days of changes in name, address, and employment.
 - To update name or employment: From Board home page, select a profession/license type from the panel on the left, then select 'Change of Name or Employer form.' Complete the sections on the fillable PDF form and email to <u>pharmacyboard@</u> <u>state.sd.us</u>.

- Name changes must be accompanied by a copy of the document supporting the name change (i.e., marriage license, divorce decree).
- To update address: log into your licensing profile and update the information. Email, phone, and fax can also be updated via this route. The link for the online sign in is: https://sdbop.igovsolution.net/online/User_login.aspx

2. How to print a license?

Licenses can be printed after logging into your account. From home page, select your license type on the left panel, then select the online renewal link. A login page to the online profile should open; enter your username and password and select either 'individual' or 'business.' Under registration information, select 'print' on the right side of the screen. The link for the online sign in is: https://sdbop.igovsolution.net/online/User_login.aspx

3. What can be done if a username/password for the BOP licensure portal is lost?

It's important to record both the username and password used for the SDBOP licensure portal as there is no option for a forgotten username online. For password retrieval, click 'forgot password' and follow the prompts to reset it. If the username is not available, you can call the Board office at 605-362-2737 for assistance.

4. How does a technician submit CE credits to the Board?

- The Boards does not play a role in technician certification and only needs to receive proof of certification. Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB) and Exam for the Certification of Pharmacy Technicians (ExCPT) are two credentialing organizations that registered technicians are approved use for certification. CE credits for certification and renewal must be submitted to your respective credentialing organization.
- Remember, technicians must be registered within 30 days and certified within 2 years of employment start date. Notify the Board of certification as soon as possible by emailing the certificate to <u>pharma</u> <u>cyboard@state.sd.us</u>.

5. How does a pharmacist submit CE credits to the Board?

- The Board no longer requires proof of CE credits to be included in a pharmacist's license renewal application. An attestation of completion of the hours is required instead and the Board is required by law to audit CE records.
- Each pharmacist is responsible for keeping records of their CE.
- ACPE accredited CE is usually reported by the sponsor to the NABP eProfile. Log into the eProfile account to view the CE hours that have been reported. If attending CE that is approved by the Board, keep the participation certificate. Board approved CE counts toward the required 12 hours.

6. How often does an intern submit non IPPE/non APPE required hours to the Board?

- A Practical Experience Affidavit (https://doh.sd.gov/boards/pharmacy/intern.aspx) must be submitted to the Board before beginning non IPPE/non APPE internship hours. If a change in site or preceptor occurs, a new affidavit must be filed before logging hours for the internship.
- Hours should be tracked using the Practical Experience Internship Hours form (https://doh.sd.gov/boards/pharmacy/intern.aspx). Each submission of hours should be reported to SDBOP 5 days after the end date of the reporting period. The end of the reporting period is the last day that hours are being recorded on the form. If the submission is late, 5% of hours will be deducted. Review other reporting requirements on the form.
- A Progress Report of Internship form (https://doh.sd.gov/boards/pharmacy/intern.aspx) should be submitted with every Practical Experience Internship Hours form. The top section of the form is completed, signed, and dated by the student while the preceptor completes the evaluation and verification sections of the form. The time range listed on this form should correspond with the dates being reported on the Hours form.
- All forms can be found under the 'Interns' tab from the Board's home page. All forms should be signed by the same preceptor unless a new affidavit is submitted to report change in preceptor.

 The Board's preferred method for receiving documents is via email at <u>pharmacyboard@state.sd.us</u>.



PharmaDrop™ Drug Take-Back Program by Melissa DeNoon, PDMP Director

For years, pharmacists in South Dakota voiced concerns to the Board of Pharmacy about the lack of easily accessible drug take-back receptacles for their patients and the public. The availability of drug take-back receptacles is key in reducing the avenue of diversion created by unused, unwanted, and expired drugs in an individual's medicine cabinet. The South Dakota Board of Pharmacy established a drug take-back program placing Trilogy MedWaste's PharmaDrop™ receptacles in South Dakota hospitals and retail pharmacies. Since its inception in 2017, the program has placed 84 permanent drug take-back receptacles across South Dakota and enrolled an additional 5 locations that had their own receptacles to the South Dakota PharmaDrop[™] program, bringing the total number of locations managed through the program to 89. A comprehensive list of permanent drug take-back sites can be found on AvoidOpioidSD.com, 'Take Action', 'Take Back Sites'. This program provides an option for the safe disposal of an individual's non-prescription and prescription drugs, including controlled substances, and is a key component in South Dakota's strategy to address our state's misuse, abuse, and diversion of controlled prescription drugs. Hello from the College of Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions! I'm excited to share some recent highlights.

SDSU's phlebotomy certificate was ranked by EduMed as the nation's number one online phlebotomy program in 2023. This award is affirmation of the great work that was done by those who got this relatively

new program off the ground.

We have high-quality faculty at SDSU.

- Kassi Erickson, instructor in the medical lab science program, was selected as MLS Teacher of the Year by the MLS Club. This is the 2nd year in a row that Kassi has been selected for this award.
- Shanna O'Connor, head of pharmacy practice at South Dakota State University, is one of seven faculty members nationwide to be chosen as a mentor for pharmacy residents in a program from the American Pharmacists Association Foundation.
- Jennifer Ball, associate professor in pharmacy practice, was recognized by the American College of Clinical Pharmacy (ACCP) for her outstanding work toward the publication of a home-study series for ambulatory care pharmacists, Erin Miller partnered with her on the project.
- Faculty from the START-SD project team authored
 a manuscript on the harm reduction strategies, which
 has been published in the Journal of the American
 Pharmacists Association. Chris Robbins, Erin Miller,
 Jennifer Ball, and Jeremy Daniel from the College
 of Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions, Mary Emery
 and Patricia Ahmed from the School of Psychology,
 Sociology, and Rural Studies, and Aaron Hunt, the
 former coordinator of SDSU's Public Health program,
 each contributed to the manuscript titled "Promoting
 harm reduction in rural South Dakota using an
 interdisciplinary consortium."

Scholarships are a major focus of fundraising for all our programs. The Commission on Accreditation for Respiratory Care awarded \$5,000 for our program at the Rapid City campus and \$5,000 for the satellite program at Sioux Falls. The scholarships can be used for current and future practitioners.

Our faculty and staff are great stewards of their community. Wenfeng An, professor and Markl Faculty Scholar in Cancer Research, graduated from the Citizens Police Academy in Brookings. Graduates of the Citizens Police Academy go through extensive training and are then relied upon to serve in a variety of ways in the community. Jordan Baye who teaches in the Department of Pharmacy Practice received the Sanford Clinic Hero Award from the health organization for its third quarter. The Hero Award highlights employees who go above and beyond in each of the Sanford values of calling, courage, family, community, service, resolve and advancement. Each fall, units are challenged to collect items for SDSU's student food pantry "Jack's Cupboard". For the second year in a row, the College won the Pack the Pantry initiative by collecting the most items compared to other colleges, academic departments, non-academic units, and student organizations.

Searches are underway for the following positions: MPH program coordinator, respiratory care instructors, director of clinical education for respiratory care, medical laboratory science instructors and a pharmacy practice faculty.

Retirement Blindspots

Some life and financial factors that can sometimes be overlooked.

We all have our "blue sky" visions of the way retirement should be, yet our futures may unfold in ways we do not predict. So, as you think about your "second act," you may want to consider some life and financial factors that can suddenly arise.

You may end up retiring earlier than you expect. If you leave the workforce at "full" retirement age (FRA), which is 67 for those born in 1960 and later, you may be eligible to claim "full" Social Security benefits. Working until 67 may be worthwhile because it will reduce your monthly Social Security benefits if you claim them between age 62 and your FRA.¹ Now, do most Americans retire at 67? Not according to the annual survey from the Employee Benefit Research Institute (EBRI). In EBRI's 2020 Retirement Confidence Survey, 16% of pre-retirees expected to retire between ages 66-69, and 31% thought they would retire at age 70 or later. The reality is different. In surveying current retirees, EBRI found that only 6% had worked into their seventies. In fact, 70% percent of them had left work before age 65, and 33% had retired before age 60.²

You may see retirement as an extension of the present rather than the future. This is only natural, as we all live in the present – but the future will arrive. The costs you have to shoulder later in retirement may exceed those at the start of retirement. As you may be retired for 20 or 30 years, it is wise to take a long-term view of things.

You may have a health insurance gap. If you retire before age 65, what do you do about health coverage? You may shoulder 100% of the cost. Looking forward, you may need extended care, and it seems to get more expensive each year. Wealthy households may be able to "self-insure" against extended care, but many other households struggle. In Genworth's 2020 Cost of Care Survey, the median monthly cost of a semi-private room in a nursing home is \$7,738. In California, it is \$9,023; in Florida, \$8,803.3 Suppose you become disabled or seriously ill, and working is out of the question. How do you make ends meet?

Age may catch up to you sooner rather than later.

You may stay fit, active, and mentally sharp for decades to come, but if you become mentally or physically infirm, you need to find people to trust to manage your finances.

You could be alone one day. As anyone who has ever lived alone realizes, a single person does not simply live on 50% of a couple's income. Keeping up a house, or even a condo, can be tough when you are elderly. Driving can be a concern. If your spouse or partner is absent, will there be someone to help you in the future?

These are some of the blind spots that can surprise us in retirement. They may quickly affect our money and quality of life. If you age with an awareness of them, you may have the opportunity to manage the outcome better.

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The Ballad of Snowbirds and Audits

The winter months have many pharmacies mailing prescriptions to their snowbird patients who leave their northern nests for more hospitable climates. Pharmacies want to keep these patients happy and coming back when the weather is nicer and may look to mailing maintenance medications to them when they have migrated out of state. Although these pharmacies may think they are doing the right thing for patient care, and their business, they may also be setting themselves up for audit failure.

Unfortunately, this does not just apply to northern states with snowbird patients. Many states now have laws that require nonresident pharmacies to obtain a license to ship, mail, deliver, or dispense prescription medications into their states. Auditors take advantage of these laws to recoup money from well-meaning pharmacies who may not even know that mailing a prescription out of state is a problem! For pharmacies situated close to the state border, delivering into a neighboring state carries the same risks. PAAS National® has seen these claims cited as law violations with limited appeal options.

PAAS Tips:

- Before mailing/delivering prescriptions out of state, it is a good idea to check with that state's Board of Pharmacy to see if there are any licensure requirements for doing so.
- Be aware of your contract obligations and which PBMs do not allow mailing of prescriptions to patients.
- The COVID-19 pandemic had many PBMs make concessions to allow mailing during the Public Health Emergency (PHE). Keep up to date on concession expirations by downloading the PAAS COVID-19 PBM/Payers Concessions Chart¹, available at paasnational.com/covid19.

 - Ensure you can prove, on an audit, the patient received their medication with tracking information that links to the prescription. See the January 2022 Newsline article, <u>Mailing</u> <u>Prescriptions: How Do You Prove Patient Receipt?</u> ²

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
