Director's COMMENTS



100th Legislative Session

Both chambers have gaveled out for the main run of the 100th Legislative Session. It was a busy one for the South Dakota Pharmacists Association and the Commercial and Legislative Branch (that is the legislative arm of SDPhA), but not always in the traditional sense. Much of our work this session focused on what the future might look

like as a whole for the association, as well as our lobbying branch. However, we of course monitored several bills of consequence to the profession and engaged where appropriate. You can find all the bills we monitored and took a position on in the Action Center on our website. Select the <u>"Bills" tab</u> for the complete list.

HB 1016 and the Repeal of SDPhA

HB 1016 - an act to revise provisions related to pharmacy and increase fees - this 20-page bill from the South Dakota Board of Pharmacy boiled down to three major things: A fee increase for wholesalers, a lot of cleanup language from the Legislative Research Council (LRC), and a repeal of the South Dakota Pharmacists Association and its funding mechanism from statute.

The bill was delivered to the Governor for his signature March 12. So as of the date of this report, your association is now just the governor's signature away from coming out of statue. It's truly the end of an era for SDPhA and will create a seismic shift in the day-to-day operations of the association. This will mean a new structure for SDPhA which will have to include membership dues.

The bill had a winding road to the Governor's desk, as after its introduction, SDPhA continued to have conversations with the administration. At one point, the bill was amended to include a one-time appropriation of \$200,000 to restore SDPhA for prior work completed as per SDCL 36-11-6 for

the 2023-2024 fiscal year. The BOP voted to send funds, as per statute, in June of that year, then rescinded the vote in December citing insufficient funds. However, after several conversations with the administration, we reached an agreement that rendered the appropriation moot. The amendment was removed which returned the bill to its original form, and we supported the bill. (More details on what that means for the association's future a little later in this report.)

SB 154 – 340B contract pharmacy

SDPhA C&L Branch joined with the South Dakota Association of Healthcare Organizations (SDAHO), Sanford, Avera and several others in support of SB 154 – a bill to prohibit pharmaceutical manufacturers from interfering in contracts between 340B entities and pharmacies and to provide a penalty therefor. The bill handily cleared the Senate. The House turned into more of a public battle fueled by out-of-state interest groups which sponsored digital ads, social media ads, TV ads and even a mobile digital billboard truck circling the Capitol. The opposition also flew in several out-of-state lobbyists to work against the legislation. When those lobbyists started telling our Representatives this bill hurt small town community pharmacy, we knew it was time to send in you, the experts, to set the record straight. We sent out the call, and more than one hundred South Dakota pharmacists responded with messages to their member of the House. We know many of you reached out in other ways as well. After hearing it from all of you, lawmakers sent a loud and clear message that they trust their local pharmacist - all but 5 members of the House supported the bill in the end. Gov. Larry Rhoden has already signed SB 154. It will become law July 1. 2025.

Other Key Bills

There were other bills of consequence with which we engaged or monitored with great interest. The entire list can be found in the SDPhA Action Center. A few worthy of quick note: the annual scheduling bill; HB 1223 - a conscience objection bill which we opposed and was heavily amended several times; HB 1152 – a bill to prohibit the enforcement

and implementation of directives from intergovernmental organizations, and to provide a penalty therefor which we also opposed; and HB 1141 – an act to provide an exception for employers to acquire and distribute opioid antagonists that are available over the counter, which we supported.

Historic Change

We continue all this work while also working through major changes at the Association. If you're unaware of the history leading up to this year's HB 1016, SDPhA was handed a first tough blow at the **December 2023 South** Dakota Board of Pharmacy (SD BOP) meeting. It was at this meeting that the board voted to rescind their June 2023 vote to send SDPhA 80% of the pharmacist renewal license fees as per SDCL 36-11-6 for FY 2023-2024.

Administration and maintained ongoing communication with the Governor's office, the Department of Health, and the BOP. Those conversations lead to a few rounds of changes to the bill, ultimately leading to where we are today – an agreement in which SDPhA is restored for past services rendered as per our duties in SDCL 36-11-6, and a bill in which SDPhA agreed to come out of statute, and the BOP received the fee increase necessary to make its budget whole.

The Impact on SDPhA's Bottom Line

SDPhA has always operated in arrears given that our fiscal year runs July 1- June 30, and we would wait to send the BOP the invoice for the fees for the above referenced votes until after the October license renewal window closed. That means by the time the BOP voted to rescind the June 2023 vote, we were effectively 6 months into our FY, operating as normal and executing our duties as defined in statute, when suddenly we found we would be without our main source of revenue.

As of this report, we have operated nearly completely on reserves for 1 year and 9 months. We have worked diligently to cut costs where we can while dealing with the reality that there was not much to cut in the first place. In addition, we have had to be incredibly careful with how we moved forward given our status in statute. We have worked extremely hard to craft the next steps, while also ensuring we did not misstep regarding our current status and obligations.

What Repeal Means for You

The SDPhA Board of Directors is working through several ways to bring non-dues revenue to the association. However, there is no doubt SDPhA will have to charge member dues for pharmacists. With our removal from statute, pharmacists will no longer receive SDPhA

What Repeal Means for Lobbying Efforts The Commercial and Legislative Fund has historically sustained the lobbying arm of SDPhA. Due to our funding mechanism, general funds were not to be used for that purpose. The reality is, to ensure the profession has a seat at the table, first and foremost, the Association needs the funds in the general fund to exist. (Clearly, we can't continue to operate without our main source of income for much longer.) Second, and separately, we must have enough in the C&L Fund to pay for the chair.

Lobbying is an extremely expensive, but necessary function. The same firm has represented SDPhA for decades, and the executive director has historically performed some lobbying duties as well. That has all kept our rate extremely low. Before the past 3-4 years, our

lobbying expenses typically totaled about \$12,000 per year. Even then, expenses far outpaced contributions. For the past few years, we have needed additional lobbyists, which means expenses have increased dramatically. We have spent an average of \$33,000/year for the past three years. Those costs will only continue to increase, yet they remain far below the going rate for most lobbyists. As we continue to work through PBM and other significant issues, we simply need our lobbyists to protect the profession.

For the 2024-2025 fiscal year, contributions are well below our costs. Supporting the C&L branch is the most important thing South Dakota pharmacists can do right now to assist and protect the profession of pharmacy in our state.

SDPhA's future will soon involve a mix of associate memberships, corporate sponsors, pharmacist memberships (independent of the current structure a referenced above), and even possibly technician memberships. I cannot stress enough the importance of getting to your district meeting and the annual meeting this year to engage with us not only on things like the pending pharmacist dues structure, but also – this is where you get to give your feedback on what SDPhA's priorities should be going forward. PBMs, reimbursements, practice act revisions – these are all issues we hear from different practice areas. These are also all issues that take a varying degree of preparation and effort. Some might be one-year efforts. Some, two. Others - three to five. One thing is VERY clear in all of this - it will take all of us to come together in sustainable support of the association to ensure we're here to bring needed change forward, while protecting the profession.

South Dakota's PBM LAWS IN ACTION

With HB 1135 (2023) now the law in South Dakota, our focus has been assessing how it works in practical application for regulating Pharmacy Benefit Managers (PBMs). We find there are somehow still people who are unaware of the regulations, and the processes for filing a complaint. SDPhA is planning exciting upcoming educational opportunities on these topics, and we encourage you to keep an eye out for emails, posts, etc. with more details.

In the months that followed HB 1135 becoming law, SDPhA went to work with the South Dakota Division of Insurance (SD DOI) on the process and procedure for filing complaints and violations of the new law. We thank the DOI for bringing us to the table early and often in this process. We collaborated with them to create an intake form that is simple and direct, yet comprehensive.

As a reminder, here are the highlights of the bill:

- Prohibit direct or indirect retroactive claim adjustments unless it's the result of a technical billing error, audit, fraudulent or duplicate claim. (Section 13)
- Prohibit the numerous onerous fees PBMs charge pharmacies. (Section 14)
- MAC list regulation to help ensure pharmacies are paid fairly and transparently. (Sections 15-16)
- Prohibit a PBM from reimbursing its own pharmacies more than it does other resident South Dakota pharmacies (Section 17)
- Strengthens gag clause prohibition (Section 10)

In addition, the bill strengthens audit (Section 4, 7) and reporting (Section 18) requirements for PBMs (including identifying all instances of spread spicing) and establishes the conditions under which the Division of Insurance may suspend, revoke, or deny a PBM's license (Section 19).

One especially important note – it is incumbent upon us to report issues and they occur and provide the proper documentation. You need to file complaints IN WRITING via the form. A phone call to the DOI is not going to initiate the process. The Division has also hired an investigator and a pharmacist, but the process is still a bit novel for everyone. We are committed to taking the time to work through any issues that arise with the process as we go. Update to NIOSH List of Hazardous Medications By Jenna Heyen, Pharmacy Inspector

In December of 2024, NIOSH (National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health) published the much-anticipated update to the List of Hazardous Drugs in Health Care Settings, 2024. Changes in the classification of medications were based on manufacturer instructions, and from definitions and classifications by agencies involved in the review of medications such as the NTP (National Toxicology Program) and the IARC (International Agency for Research on Cancer). With this update, 25 medications were added, and 7 medications were removed from the 2016 version. Another notable change was made to the overall formatting with a restructuring from a three-table format to a twotable format. The former table three (Group 3: Nonantineoplastic drugs that primarily have adverse reproductive effects) has been removed and the notation regarding reproductive/developmental toxicity is now found as an aspect of the new Table 2.

Many medications were removed due to no longer being identified as hazardous by NIOSH, but not all. One item that was removed from the list that requires special consideration is BCG. According to NIOSH, this was removed as it is an infectious agent and not classified as a drug per the FDA. It is important to highlight that this product still requires special handling and facilities must review package insert information to ensure it is handled properly.

It is prudent to note that medications included in this 2024 publication are those that were approved or had updated safety information through December 2015. So, while the list is updated it is not all inclusive of new medications that have come to market since Jan 2016. As new medications become available sites will need to continue to review and make an assessment for their specific location regarding potential risk that a new medication carries. Per USP 800, a list of hazardous drugs based upon NIOSH's most recent publication must be maintained for each site and must be reviewed every 12 months along with the site's assessment of risk. Each facility will need to review and update current lists, and policy and procedures that are affected by the changes in the new NIOSH list. The Board will be enforcing the updated NIOSH 2024 list 6 months following its release. PDMP DATA INTEGRITY By Melissa DeNoon, PDMP Director

Ensuring the accuracy of PDMP data, also known as data integrity, is an ongoing focus of the PDMP. Data integrity is critically important since this tool aids in clinical decisionmaking impacting patient care. Pharmacists are key stakeholders as both PDMP users and gatekeepers of the data submitted.

Database errors fall into two categories, errors on dispensation records in the database and errors on dispensation records not in the database. Errors not in the database occur if a dispensation record is missing one or more of the required data elements for submission per ARSD 20:51:32:03. Pharmacists-in-Charge (PICs) are responsible for accurate and complete data submissions. To assist in-state PICs with this type of error correction, the RX Management feature was enabled within PIC PMP AWARxE accounts in addition to PICs receiving error report notification emails from the PDMP platform vendor. PICs are now able to address these errors very timely ensuring completeness of patient

reports. Errors in the database are not as readily identified. These errors are records that contain the required data elements for submission but have an error in one or more of these data elements that occurred during prescription data entry and were not identified and corrected prior to dispensing.

In order to identify errors in the database, the PDMP began Please check the **Board of Pharmacy page on the Boards** a prescription audit process performed by the Board and Commissions Website on the South Dakota Board of Pharmacy's inspectors as part of their annual retail of Pharmacy website for the time, location, and agenda pharmacy inspections. This audit process is as follows: for future Board meetings.



The pharmacy inspector reviews the hardcopies/eRXs of the ten prescriptions selected. The patient's name is the only field verified by the inspector for accuracy at the pharmacy; the remaining data elements as found on the original prescription are recorded on an audit form to be reviewed by PDMP staff post-inspection. After review, PDMP staff will notify the PIC if errors are found that need to be corrected. The most common error identified through these audits has been submission of the wrong prescriber DEA number resulting in the prescription being attributed to the wrong prescriber on a patient's PDMP report. Wrong DEA number errors have implications for both the patient and the prescriber. Patient safety may be compromised if another healthcare provider has questions about a patient's PDMP report and unknowingly contacts a provider who did not prescribe the controlled substance(s) in question. A prescriber may face inappropriate consequences including targeted discipline for prescription histories that are not actually theirs. Reasons for these DEA errors were found by PDMP staff to be: 1) Two prescribers with the same first and last names, 2) Data entry error of one of the first two letters of the DEA number, 3) Data entry error of one of the seven numbers of the DEA number, and 4) Pharmacy-created DEA number that passes the checksum formula. Errors due to reasons one, two, and three can almost always be avoided if pharmacists use the DEA number, which is the only unique prescriber identifier, to verify if the prescriber chosen at data entry is correct. Reason number four should not occur due first to its illegality but also because the pharmacy-created number may actually belong to a prescriber who will then incorrectly appear on a patient report.



The Next Big Wave: Anticipating a Surge in HIPAA Compliance Audits

Desk audits, onsite audits, invoice audits...and HIPAA compliance audits?! Unfortunately every community pharmacy has some familiarity with third party payor audits, and PAAS National® audit analysts bring their expertise to guide members through the entire audit process, ensuring everything goes as smoothly as possible.

But what about HIPAA compliance audits? With a potential surge in these audits on the horizon, it is important for covered entities (i.e., pharmacies) to evaluate their HIPAA compliance policies and procedures to fortify their program.

You may ask, "Why are these audits being performed?" The Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health (HITECH) Act requires that the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) conduct periodic HIPAA audits, submit an annual report to Congress on HIPAA compliance, and provide annual guidance on the most effective technical safeguards for meeting Security Rule requirements. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), within HHS, is tasked with overseeing these responsibilities. To verify OCR was performing their respective duties, the Office of Inspector General (OIG) performed a review of OCR's HIPAA compliance audit process.

According to the OIG November 2024 brief, "OCR fulfilled its requirement under the HITECH Act to perform periodic HIPAA audits. However:

- OCR's HIPAA audit implementation was too narrowly scoped to effectively assess ePHI protections and demonstrate a reduction of risks within the health care sector. Specifically:
 - OCR's audits consisted of assessing only 8 of 180 HIPAA Rules requirements; and
 - Only 2 of those 8 requirements were related to Security Rule administrative safeguards and none were related to physical and technical security safeguards.
- OCR oversight of its HIPAA audit program was not effective at improving cybersecurity protections at covered entities and business associates."

OIG recommended OCR increase the volume and breadth of their audits to raise their assurance that covered entities (like pharmacies) and business associates have complied with the Security Rule. OIG stated these audits will also help OCR provide covered entities with more opportunities to strengthen their security over ePHI.

Additionally, on December 27, 2024, OCR issued a Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) to modify the HIPAA Security Rule to strengthen cybersecurity protections for ePHI. This is the first time since 2013 that OCR seeks to update the Security Rule. With the dramatic increase in cybersecurity threats, both malicious and unintentional, it seems that updates are more important now than ever. A fact sheet on the NPRM is available online.

Since HIPAA compliance audits may be in your future (along with Security Rule updates), now is a great time to evaluate your HIPAA compliance program to get a good handle on where your vulnerabilities are, what threats you have and the risk of those threats. If you're not sure where to start, check out the PAAS FWA/HIPAA Compliance Program!

Updated Form Expiration 12/31/2027 **Medicare Drug Coverage & Your Rights Notice**

The CMS-10147 Form, also known as the Medicare Drug Coverage and Your Rights Notice, must be distributed to Medicare Part D beneficiaries when a prescription is not covered at the point-of-sale. This notice informs beneficiaries about their right to contact their Part D plan to request a coverage determination, including an exception. The distribution of the CMS-10147 form is a requirement for all pharmacies, including mail order, specialty and LTC. While documentation is not required confirming distribution of the CMS-10147, your pharmacy should have a policy and procedure in place addressing how and when the form is being distributed to patients. PBM field auditors have been known to ask questions about your process and may ask to see a copy of the form to ensure you have the most up-to-date version.

On 02/11/2025, CMS issued a memo to announce the availability of a renewed Medicare Drug Coverage and Your Rights (CMS-10147) "Pharmacy Notice". While there were no major changes made to the form, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) approved a new expiration date for OMB Control # 0938-0975. The new expiration date is 12/31/2027.

PAAS Tips:

- on the CMS website
 - If the form is integrated into your software system, be sure that your software vendor has uploaded the form with the new expiration date of 12/31/2027
- Beneficiaries that reside in a long-term care facility are not exempt from receiving the notice; LTC pharmacies should review our guidance in the manual
- or change to alternative therapy does not waive the notification requirement
- date. You will not be compliant if this is not done by 3/1/2025 as the previous expiration date is 2/28/2025
