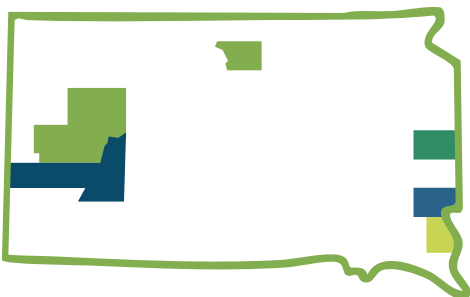

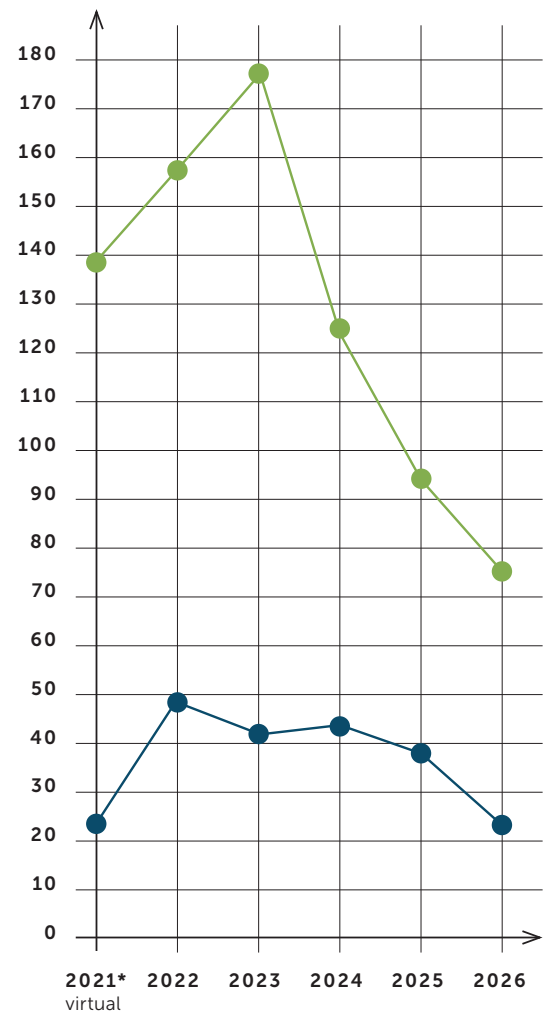

Proposed Bylaws Amendment – Section 2

Redline: deleted language is shown with strikethrough; proposed new language is underlined.

Section 2. ~~–All registered pharmacists in the State of South Dakota who have secured a current annual certificate of registration to practice pharmacy from the State Board of Pharmacy are eligible for membership in the Association.–~~

Any pharmacist who either:

1. holds a current license or registration to practice pharmacy in the State of South Dakota; or
2. holds a current license or registration to practice pharmacy in another state, territory, or jurisdiction of the United States, is in good standing, and is currently practicing pharmacy in the State of South Dakota as authorized by law is eligible for active membership in the Association.

Active members are entitled to all of the rights and privileges of the Association and may vote, serve as an officer or director of the Association and participate in all of the meetings of the Association. The membership fee shall be set annually by the board of directors.

A copy of the Association's current Bylaws is available to members upon request from the Association office.



SD Board of Pharmacy

Tyler Laetsch, PharmD // Executive Director



The South Dakota Board of Pharmacy would like to welcome each of you to the 140th SDPhA Annual Meeting. We are sorry our office is unable to attend this year. We are working on the new website and licensing platform in preparation for a rollout later this fiscal year.

In addition to the platform, the inLumon team is working with us to launch a new website for the Board. We are excited about these changes and have been working in the background tirelessly to get this platform operational. Once we get a definite timeline, we will continue to push these notices out. Look for more information in the upcoming months on this. In the meantime, any renewals or licensing are still being performed in our current iGov system.

The 2026 legislative session allowed us to submit SB14. This legislation was introduced largely to include language for remote drop sites and further cleanup of the pharmacy chapter of South Dakota Codified Law 36-11. After this bill was passed, we began working on the rules for these remote drop sites. Also included in the rule updates were the operational waiver process and cleanup of the entire pharmacy administrative rules, Article 20:51. These rule updates were completed at the Interim Rules Review Committee meeting in Pierre on July 14th. The rule changes took effect on August 17, 2026.

SB90 was also passed, which allowed the South Dakota Medical Cannabis Program to share additional information with the PDMP. Once operational, the shared information will be used to add an indicator on a patient's PDMP report if that patient has a medical cannabis card. We look forward to rolling this out sometime in the fall of 2026.

As I mentioned last year, the Board was notified that the current licensing software is phasing out, and we began the selection process for a new platform. The new platform chosen is inLumon. This platform will be great not only for our team, but all licensees and registrants.

Last month, we sent a notice to all pharmacists in South Dakota: a survey from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for all small dispensers. If this notice pertains to any of you, please take the time to submit a response. This will be useful for the FDA to determine the Drug Supply Chain Security Act (DSCSA) requirements that, as of now, will be enforced for small dispensers in November of 2026.

Nationally, we are currently following the FDA peptide discussions, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) potentially scheduling 7-OH, and the rescheduling of marijuana, along with GLP-1 safety concerns.

It has been another great year, and I am fortunate to have the great staff and all of you to work with. I want to thank all of you for all the work you do for all of us in the state, and I look forward to the future of the profession and what will come. Changes will happen, and it is always exciting to think about what will be next.

Greetings from the College of Pharmacy and Allied Health Professions (COPAHP) at South Dakota State University!

This summer has seen exciting developments and accomplishments across the college, with faculty, staff, students, and alumni earning recognition for their

scholarship, leadership, service, and professional achievements.

Overall Highlights

SDSU's Student Collaboration for the Advancement and Promotion of Pharmacy (SCAPP) again earned national recognition from the American Pharmacists Association Academy of Student Pharmacists.

The organization received:

- First runner-up in the AAA division for their chapter achievement report for the 2024-2025 academic year
- Regional recognition for advancing Operation Heart, APhA-ASP's national cardiovascular health initiative

SCAPP members contributed more than 350 patient screenings and engaged over 800 community members through educational programming during the 2024-25 academic year.

Recent PharmD alum Aubrey Kooima represented Region 5 on the American Pharmacists Association Academy of Student Pharmacists National Nominating Committee last year, serving alongside student leaders from across the nation to evaluate candidates for national office and help shape the future leadership of the organization.

The South Dakota Perinatal Quality Collaborative received a \$10,000 supplemental grant to support respectful maternity care initiatives and maternal mental health programming across South Dakota. Led by Stephanie Hanson, the project will support implementation of the Respectful Maternity Care Toolkit while piloting a bibliotherapy intervention designed to reduce stigma and improve conversations about postpartum mental health.

Our Respiratory Care program's BREATHE-SD initiative recently wrapped up its grant activities. BREATHE-SD successfully expanded respiratory care education capacity, increased rural clinical training opportunities, and strengthened South Dakota's respiratory care workforce pipeline.

South Dakota State University's Medical Laboratory Science program received continuing 10-year accreditation from the National Accrediting Agency for Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS). The accreditation affirms the program's commitment to educational excellence and ensures graduates remain well positioned for certification and employment opportunities throughout the health care workforce.

Student, Faculty, and Staff Accomplishments

Students, faculty, and staff continue to engage communities throughout South Dakota through research, outreach, and service:

- Meghan Haan, a 2026 Pharm.D. graduate, was recognized with the American College of Clinical Pharmacy's Top Student Research-in-Progress Poster Award following her participation in the ACCP Virtual Poster Symposium.
- Vicki Howe was recognized as a Top Reviewer for the American Journal of Pharmaceutical Education, an honor that reflects her contributions to advancing pharmacy education scholarship.

SDSU College of Pharmacy & Allied Health Professions

Dan Hansen, PharmD // Dean & Professor

- Brooke Merry was elected to the Board of Directors for Margo's Place, Brookings County's domestic abuse shelter and advocacy organization.
- Chris Robbins and collaborators from Indiana University and Miami University had two abstracts accepted for presentation at the American Public Health Association Annual Meeting in November. The presentations focused on firearm storage behaviors among veterans and factors influencing safe storage practices using Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System data.
- Chris Robbins collaborated with faculty from USD and NSU at the South Dakota Senior Games in Huron to administer the Sustained Athlete Fitness Exam (SAFE) to approximately 50 senior athletes. The project was supported through a Governor's Research Center of Excellence summer award.
- Joe Strain accepted a temporary appointment as Assistant Vice President of Operations for the West River Health Science Center. In addition to his current responsibilities as professor and assistant department head, he will work with university leadership and regional partners to support the center's ongoing development and collaboration efforts.
- Hemachand Tummala's and Sanku Mallik's grant proposal was selected for funding through the Haarberg 3D Center. The \$180,000 award will support the purchase of updated research instrumentation, replacing equipment that is more than 15 years old and increasing research capabilities for SDSU investigators and collaborators throughout the state.

The Sanford Research Eastern South Dakota Research Symposium featured invited presentations from COPAHP faculty Bilal Hafeez, Erin Miller, and Tanvir Khaliq, while several COPAHP doctoral students shared their research through poster presentations.

Several faculty members also contributed to the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (AACP) Annual Meeting. Highlights included:

- Kristy Ullom completed her term as chair-elect of the Administrative and Financial Officers Special Interest Group and received the 2026 Distinguished Service Award. She also presented on shared-services models in higher education administration.
- Hemachand Tummala began his term as chair of the Pharmaceutics Special Interest Group and presented both a poster and podium presentation related to innovative pharmacy education approaches.
- Emily Van Klompenburg delivered a podium presentation focused on pharmacy law education.
- Shanna O'Connor presented nationally on emerging work related to medical billing education and pharmacy practice.

SDPhA Annual Financial Report

Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2026, with FY 2026–2027 Year-to-Date Results

About This Report

Historically, SDPhA's membership and funding structure was connected to the state licensure renewal process. That structure also resulted in financial reporting practices that reflected the requirements associated with that funding mechanism.

Today, membership in SDPhA is paid separately from professional licensure fees. As our membership and revenue model has changed, our financial reporting to members is also evolving.

This report is designed to provide members with clear, meaningful transparency into the Association's overall financial health, performance, and stewardship of member resources. Detailed operational and board-level financial information continues to be reviewed by the Board of Directors at each board meeting as part of its fiduciary oversight responsibilities.

This approach aligns the level of financial reporting with the respective roles of members and directors, while maintaining SDPhA's commitment to transparency, accountability, and responsible financial stewardship.

Financial Overview

SDPhA operates on a fiscal year beginning July 1 and ending June 30. The following pages provide high-level financial statements for the completed fiscal year ended June 30, 2026 (FY 2025–2026), as well as FY 2026–2027 year-to-date results through September 2, 2026.

Association Funds as of September 2, 2026

Checking: \$51,578.66
Investments: \$406,576.28
Total Cash and Investments: \$458,154.94

These funds provide important financial reserves as the Association continues to adapt to its voluntary membership and evolving revenue model.

FY 2025–2026 Budget Performance

SDPhA concluded the fiscal year ended June 30, 2026, with an operating deficit of \$119,469.72. The deficit was greater than originally budgeted but was not unexpected as the Association continued adapting to changes in its membership and revenue structure.

Several significant factors affected FY 2025–2026 financial performance:

- Membership dues and corporate partnerships, the Association's largest ongoing sources of revenue, were both below budget.
- Scholarship and grant opportunities helped offset costs and supported important foundational work associated with the transition to a voluntary membership model.
- The Board authorized the use of reserves to support operating expenses during this period of transition.

The accompanying financial statements provide additional information regarding FY 2025–2026 revenues and expenditures.

FY 2026–2027 Year-to-Date

Through September 2, 2026, FY 2026–2027 financial performance remains consistent with expectations. The Association currently has a year-to-date operating surplus of \$23,720.15.

The FY 2026–2027 budget was developed using conservative assumptions and reflects a budgeted operating deficit of approximately \$149,000. The budget assumes essentially no growth from current levels in membership, corporate partnerships, grants, scholarships, or other revenue opportunities. In other words, it provides a baseline view of the fiscal year if current conditions remain largely unchanged.

The Board does not view this level of deficit spending as a desired long-term operating model. Throughout the year, SDPhA will continue working to strengthen membership recruitment and retention, expand corporate partnerships, pursue appropriate grant and scholarship opportunities, develop additional sources of revenue, and carefully manage expenses.

The Board will continue to monitor actual performance against the budget throughout the year and make adjustments as appropriate to support the Association's long-term financial sustainability.

Because year-to-date results represent only the first portion of the fiscal year, they should be viewed as an indication of current performance rather than a forecast of the final FY 2026–2027 year-end result.

Stewardship of Association Resources

An annual operating budget is prepared for each fiscal year and reviewed and approved by the Board of Directors. At each regular board meeting, the Board reviews financial statements, expenditures, budget-to-actual performance, cash and reserve levels, and other significant financial matters.

Financial results are also shared with the membership each year as part of the Association's Annual Meeting.

The Board regularly evaluates the Association's financial performance, cash position, reserves, budget performance, and financial risks. Its objective is to maintain appropriate financial reserves while responsibly investing Association resources in programs, services, and strategic priorities that advance SDPhA's mission and provide value to members.

Financial Administration and Reporting

SDPhA uses QuickBooks accounting software to record its financial activities and transactions. Professional bookkeeping and accounting services are provided by Anderson, Nill and Associates in Pierre, South Dakota.

The Board receives and reviews financial reports throughout the year as part of its fiduciary oversight responsibilities.

The Association also files all applicable federal information returns, including IRS Form 990, in accordance with federal requirements.

Treasurer's Report

The Association concluded FY 2025–2026 in a stable financial position while continuing to adapt to a significant change in its membership and revenue model.

Under the previous structure, membership was associated with professional license renewal, creating a predictable membership base and revenue stream. Today, membership is a separate and voluntary investment made by individual members. This requires SDPhA to place greater emphasis on demonstrating member value, recruiting and retaining members, strengthening corporate partnerships, and developing diversified sources of revenue.

The FY 2026–2027 budget reflects conservative revenue assumptions and provides a baseline against which the Board can measure performance throughout the year. While the approved budget reflects a significant operating deficit if current revenue levels remain unchanged, the Association also maintains meaningful financial reserves while the Board works to strengthen recurring revenue and improve long-term sustainability.

Early FY 2026–2027 results are consistent with expectations. The Board will continue to closely monitor financial performance, reserve levels, and progress throughout the fiscal year while balancing responsible financial stewardship with investments that advance SDPhA's mission and provide value to members.

Code of Ethics

Adopted October 20, 1886

The members of the Dakota Pharmaceutical Association considering it necessary that some mutual understanding should exist in regard to the moral principles guiding them in their profession hereby agree upon the following code of ethics.

We accept the United States Pharmacopoeia as our standard and guide for all official preparations, and recognize a variance from its rules only in exceptional cases, where sufficient authority has proven some other process more reliable to attain the same end. This section is not intended to interfere with the dispensing of prescriptions or medicines ordered in accordance with foreign Pharmacopoeias.

1. Recognizing the value of alcohol as a therapeutic and the propriety of its being dispensed as such by pharmacists, yet deploring the widespread evil resulting from its indiscriminate use in its hundred insidious forms, we condemn any attempt to make it a prominent feature of our business as unprofessional; and we denounce the loose practice of allowing it to be used on the premises, in any shape, as a beverage, as degrading, and we urge upon pharmacists the duty of exercising, at all times, a conscientious care in dispensing a drug liable to such dangerous abuse.
2. We discountenance all secret formulas between physicians and pharmacists, and consider it our duty to communicate such to each other when requested.
3. We distinctly repudiate the practice of allowing physicians a percentage on their prescriptions as derogatory to both professions.
4. We will endeavor, as far as it lies in our power to refrain from compromising the professional reputation of physicians, and we expect the same comity from them.
5. Since the professional training of pharmacists does not include those branches which enable the physician to diagnose and treat disease, we should, in all practical cases decline to give medical advice, and refer the applicant to a regular physician.
6. The growing demands of the age require that those who follow the profession of pharmacy should be educated to a higher standard. Therefore, we consider it our duty individually and collectively, to encourage the advancement of knowledge in our profession generally, and particularly by stimulating our assistants to attend the lectures of a college pharmacy, and by aiding and assisting them to do so.
7. Considering it expedient that some rule should be adopted to enforce the provisions of our code, we hereby agree, if any just cause of complaint of its violation be found against a member of this Association, to bring the case before a special, or at the next general meeting of the Association, when the accused, after being heard in his own defense, may be expelled by a vote of two-thirds of all the members present.
